Russian cellist Svetlana Muchalova graduated with first class honours from the Royal Northern College of Music in 2006 before completing her Masters with distinction. She is a Britten-Pears Young Artist and has appeared in many international festivals. Ukranian-born Slava Sidorenko gained the coveted Gold Medal at the RNCM before studying on the International Artist Diploma Course. He has won prizes in the Luzenko, Moray, Brant and Busoni international competitions and was awarded the Silver Medal of the Worshipful Company of Musicians in 2008. He made his Wigmore Hall debut in 2009. In this special concert supporting Chernobyl Relief, Svetlana and Slava offer some of the great masterworks of the cello and piano repertoire. Appropriately in this Olympic year, Brazilian composers take centre-stage in the first of two evenings celebrating the music of Latin America. Villa Lobos is rightly regarded as the most important creative figure in Twentieth Century Brazilian art music. Guarneri and Mignone who followed him made significant contributions in the field of orchestra music, chamber music and song. Tonight we also consider the work of two outstanding Mexican composers, Carlos Chavez and Sylvester Revueltas.

Handel travelled widely in Germany and Italy before settling in England. His music reflects his cosmopolitan life, and the taste of the public for whom he composed. Important works of the early years are 'Dixit Dominus', 'Utrecht Te Deum', 'Chandos Anthems', 'Coronation Anthems' (including 'Zadok the Priest'), 'Birthday Ode for Queen Anne', 'Water Music', Harpsichord Suites (including the 'Harmonious Blacksmith' Variations), the pastoral 'Acis and Galatea', and the operas 'Rinaldo', 'Ottone' and 'Julius Caesar'.

Following studies in Tokyo, San Francisco and London, Reiko Fujisawa has established herself as a soloist of formidable stature. She made her debut at Southbank Centre in 1999, at Wigmore Hall in 2003, and performed with the soloists of the R.P.O. in the inaugural season at Cadogan Hall. She has since made appearances at prestigious venues all over the UK and overseas. Fujisawa has a special affinity with the music of Bach, and in tonight’s recital offers a rare opportunity to hear the entire Goldberg Variations. The Goldbergs surely represent one of the iconic monuments of Western music - on the one hand a work of exceptional beauty and refinements, on the other a Rubik’s Cube of invention and architecture.

In the second of our Latin-American celebration evenings the focus is on Argentina, and in particular Alberto Ginastera, the centenary of whose birth falls this year. His output includes operas, ballet, symphonic works, concertos for harp, piano and cello, chamber music and a sizeable quantity of keyboard works. Ramirez wrote fine songs and choral works, including the celebrated Alfonsina y el Mar, Cantata Sudamericana and the work for which he is best known, Misa Criolla. Piazzolla revolutionised the traditional tango into a new style termed 'nuevo tango', incorporating elements from jazz and classical music.

As a member of the Japan Opera Foundation and the National Opera in Japan she has played numerous roles, including Cherubino (Marriage of Figaro), Hansel (Hansel and Gretel), Lucia (The Thievish Magpie) and Sister Martha (Dialogue des Carmelites). She was a finalist in the Harold Clarke Woodwind Competition 2006. She enjoys a busy career as a soloist, chamber musician and orchestral player in styles ranging from classical to jazz and pop.

HANDEL ii) Mature Years

A talk illustrated with fine CD recordings by Adrian Boynton

In 1711 Handel composed the first Italian opera written specially for our English audience. For the next 30 years he became immersed in the ups and downs of operatic activity in London, producing over 40 works. Then, as public interest in opera declined, he brought fresh creativity to oratorio, producing more than 20 magnificent works rich in choral drama and orchestral colour. Tonight we savour great moments from the operas 'Rodelinda', 'Partenope', 'Ariodante' and 'Alcina' and oratorios 'Israel in Egypt', 'Samson', 'Solomon', 'Semele' and 'Messiah'. Other important works of these years include the Concerto Grosso Op 3, the Organ Concerti and 'Music for the Royal Fireworks'.

LIGETI - KURTAG - REICH - GLASS

A talk illustrated with fine CD recordings by Adrian Boynton

A celebration of two Hungarians and two Americans, as we mark the 10th anniversary of Ligeti's death, the 90th birthday of George Kurtag and the 80th birthdays of Steve Reich and Philip Glass. Ligeti made skilful use of polyrhythm and micro-polyphony to forge a new compositional technique. Kurt makes great play with 'space' in many of his works. His musical language has a rare expressive intensity, crossing the borders between spontaneity and reflection. Reich and Glass are the great minimalists, creating phrase patterns marked by the use of repetition, slow harmonic rhythm and canons. These four are among a handful of contemporary composers who can legitimately claim to have altered the direction of musical history.

Alicja's recital combines outstanding repertoire from her homeland with Schuberts monumental Bb Sonata and Debussy's brilliant impression of Eastern Asia and Spain.

A talk illustrated with fine CD recordings by Adrian Boynton
Ravel is frequently classified alongside Debussy, yet the differences between these two contemporaries are more striking than the similarities. Ravel shows more respect for classical forms than Debussy, and in contrast to the latter's 'veiled impressionism', often demonstrates exceptional clarity in his scoring and structures. Tonight we hear the great piano and chamber works of the early years - 'Jeux d'eau', 'Miroirs', 'Gaspard de La Nuit', String Quartet and 'Introduction and Allegro' - outstanding orchestral works - 'Scheherazade' and 'Rhapsodie Espagnole' and the operative masterpiece 'L'Heure Espagnole'.

J.S. BACH: (i) Great Cantatas and other Church Music

A talk illustrated with fine CD recordings by Adrian Boynton

In the first of six illustrated talks covering all aspects of the composer’s legacy, Adrian Boynton surveys the Cantatas (of which there are over 200) and other Church music, contrasting the works which Bach produced during his early years at Weimar with the mature works of the Leipzig period. This is glorious repertoire, containing some of Bach’s most beautiful and least-known music.
